### Belén Public Library Programs & Services

Library services have been curtailed by the current county-based Public Health Order.

Limited curbside pick-up is available; call 966-2600 for details.

Wi-Fi is available in the parking areas surrounding the library building from 6:30 a.m. to 8:00 p.m., Monday through Saturday. The password is Guestwifi.

Appointments for computer time and virtual classroom use are suspended.

Library stacks and restrooms are still closed to the public.

### Talking Books & More

Do you or does someone you know have vision loss? Do you have a disability that prevents you from reading a standard print book, for example, an inability to hold a book or turn pages? If so, both the New Mexico State Library in Santa Fe and the Belén Public Library can help.

The State's Library for the Blind and Print Disabled (LBPD) program provides qualifying New Mexicans with audiobooks and magazines on digital cartridges. The digital player needed is provided to LBPD participants for as long as they are in the program.

The LBPD program is free. Furthermore, if any Belén Public Library patrons register with the program, our Library can become a lending source for the digital cartridges and players. This would enable local LBPD participants to receive and refresh their resources right at the Library. Otherwise, delivery is through the mail.

There are additional ways to access program materials. All LBPD titles are also available to participants as free downloads from the National Library Service's BARD (Braille and Audio Reading Download) website, as well as through BARD Mobile, a smartphone app for Android and iOS.

LBPD participants have the option to enroll in other services too: one that provides Braille books and magazines and another that provides large-print books by mail to the homebound or visually impaired.

### **PNM Donates Laptops to Libraries**

The PNM Foundation has finalized an agreement to donate 20 Surface Pro laptops to the Belén Public Library, to support local students with remote schooling.

Kathleen Pickering, Library Director, worked with PNM on this exciting opportunity and explained that the donated laptops will be distributed among the Belén, Los Lunas, and Bosque Farms libraries, as well as the Rio Abajo Community Library in La Joya, once it reopens.

The three Valencia County libraries plan to limit use of the laptops to library premises, although Los Lunas is considering a pilot program to allow check-out of a few of their devices.

At the Belén library, students will borrow the computers for use in the "virtual classroom," formerly the café area, once it reopens.

## Patron Profiles

The patrons of the Belén Public Library are as varied as its catalog holdings. And each cardholder finds value in the Library in his or her own way.

This past summer, Susan Dubiel (pronounced doo-bee-EL) opened a picture framing shop in Belén. Her mission is to make picture framing affordable for everyone. One satisfied local customer told us that Susan's price for a quality custom framing job was about one-third of the quote she received from an Albuquerque shop.

We recently connected with Susan to find out more about her business, her story, and her library experiences.

**Bookish:** Tell us about your background in framing. **Susan:** As the daughter of a carpenter, I grew up with a love of woodworking and all the fun tools out there. I began to learn about framing during a job stint at the West Point Military Academy, where the frame shop was available to employees. From there, I couldn't stop and love it more every day. My shop on Reinken is a dream come true, where my goal is to frame anything and everything at affordable prices.

**Bookish:** How long have you lived in the area and been using the Belén Library? Where are you from originally? **Susan:** I grew up in Port Jervis, New York, which is a small railroad town at the point where New York, New Jersey, and Pennsylvania meet. My very first job at the age of 14 was at the Port Jervis Free Library, where I earned a whopping \$1.00 per hour—but read some amazing books during that time. I moved to Belén (yet another small railroad town) in 1996 and got my library card within a week.

Bookish: You recently started a small business in Belén—during a pandemic(!) How did you use the resources of the Belén Library to assist you with that? Susan: The pandemic shutdown was a perfect opportunity to learn new skills. The Belén Public Library offered some of the most amazing (and free!) online classes through Gale. The subjects that were particularly helpful to me were Starting a Small Business, Excel for Beginners, and Social Media for Small Businesses. Timing on all of these courses could not have been better.

Bookish: Is there anything else you'd like to say about the role of the Belén Public Library in your life? Susan: Life without books is unimaginable. During the shutdown, thanks to the Library, I read the entire Jesse Stone series by Robert Parker. All via curbside pickup! I've used the curbside pickup many times in the past few months, and it's been flawless as well as a godsend at a time when books are needed more than ever.
