Dolly Parton's Imagination Library Comes to Valencia County

Imagine a Valencia County where every pre-K child has his or her own new books, up to 60 of them, and they're free. Dolly Parton can imagine that. Libros for Kids, an Albuquerque nonprofit, can imagine that. And so can Kathleen Pickering, Director of the Belén Public Library.

Since launching in 1995, Dolly Parton's Imagination Library has become the foremost early childhood book gifting program in the world. The Imagination Library (DPIL) provides a hand-selected, age-appropriate, high-quality book each month to registered children from birth until they turn five. Imagination Library books are free and delivered by mail directly to the child.

Through a new partnership between the Belén Public Library (BPL) and Libros for Kids, a DPIL affiliate, the Imagination Library has come to Valencia County.

If you have a child younger than 5 years of age, come to the BPL at 333 Becker Avenue in Belén and fill out a brief DPIL application. *There are no income requirements*. Children who live in Valencia County are eligible, and children who live in northern Socorro County are eligible if the family has a BPL library card. For those who live closer to the Los Lunas Public Library, applications are also available there. If you have questions, contact the BPL at <u>belenpubliclibrary@gmail.com</u> or 505-966-2600.

High-quality, age-appropriate books in the hands of all pre-K children is a game changer for any community. Because of Dolly Parton's extraordinary vision and the BPL's pivotal partnership with Libros for Kids, no young child who lives in our area need grow up without books in the home. Easy access to books facilitates family reading sessions, interaction (a critical ingredient in early brain development), vocabulary building, and kindergarten readiness.

Readers returned postcards from those states in which the books they read were set, inscribed with their comments.

True Tales of the Everglades by Stuart McIver (Florida) "This book is very educational – talks about Florida Everglades and Florida Keys."

That Quail, Robert by Margaret Stanger (Massachusetts) "A quirky book about a funny little bird determined to make his own way. Robert became part of the Kienzle family of Cape Cod in 1962 when they discovered one perfect little quail egg abandoned."

Stargazer by Anne Hillerman (New Mexico) "Part of her book series that continues the characters her father, Tony Hillerman, created. The Very Large Array down near Socorro plays an important part in the story." *The Miracle Season* by Kathy Bresnahan (Iowa) "A real life story and event. A volleyball team that won state titles suddenly lost their star player in an auto accident. Story tells the struggle of how a school and volleyball team overcame this setback."

Christmas Card Murder by Leslie Meier (Maine) "Another in the series from Tinker's Cove, Maine. Lucy Stone finds an old Christmas card with a mean message inside when she and her husband are doing renovations in their old New England farmhouse."

To Boldly Go

The staff at the Library is over the moon about their selection by the American Library Association to participate in the NASA@ My Library initiative. BPL was one of 60 libraries chosen from a national pool of about 150 applicants. NASA@ My Library was created to provide STEAM learning opportunities for library patrons across the country. STEAM is an acronym for science, technology, engineering, arts, and math.

Facebook has generously donated \$10,000 to the Friends of the BPL to be used to support NASA@ My Library activities and other upcoming space-related programming in the community.

Programs will launch on the afternoon of December 4 with portable planetarium shows provided by the New Mexico Museum of Space History (NMMSH) at Eagle Park Recreation Center (limited seating). Other activities to anticipate include a series of streaming programs about NASA projects such as the James Webb Space Telescope, the scientific successor to the Hubble Space Telescope, and earth science focused on oceans; on-site visits from subject matter experts; and three NMMSH Rocketeer Academy programs for children in early 2022: *The Awful Truth About Zero-G* (kids reenact the discovery of gravity and learn about research in space), *Gimme A Hand* (kids build a working model of a hand and program it to pick up a pencil), and *Alien Autopsy* (kids work in a quarantine glovebox to dissect "alien" lifeforms).
